

FOLLOWING JESUS

In some churches this weekend people will hear the readings from Year A because these are part of the RCIA process. The gospel from John tells the story of the Samaritan woman at the well. Jesus asked her for a drink of water and in confusion she wondered how a Jewish man could ask her to give him water, because it was forbidden by the custom at the time.

Jesus indicated he can give her life-giving water. The water he offers her is forgiveness and eternal life. Jesus revealed himself to her. He said, "I am the Christ, the one who is speaking with you." We should not be surprised he reveals himself to a non-Jew. She, like many Samaritans, had been waiting for the Messiah. They were eager to receive him.

As people who have be raised in the Catholic and Christian Faith, we may find it hard to accept and believe in the Jesus of the gospels. Like many people of his time, we are expecting something earth shattering and overwhelming.

In some cases we are getting that; out of control wildfire, storms, hurricanes and earthquakes. Yet we don't recognize these signs. As Jesus said, the people of his time wanted to see great signs. He said they had already had the sign of Jonah. They did not believe Jonah, so why would they believe Jesus?

We have the witness of the gospels, the words of Jesus to his followers, and the words of the disciples and apostles in modern times. We have the sign of the Eucharist, which is God present with us. The Lord continues to forgive our sins, heal us and offer us lifegiving food and drink.

What happened to the purple color for Lent? Recall how the third Sunday in Advent

is known as Gaudete Sunday and there is pink/rose colored vestments and other items. Lent has the same thing—it's just the fourth Sunday, and it is known as Laetare Sunday. The color is a glimpse of the joy which awaits us at Christ's coming. Laetare means "rejoice" in Latin. It is meant as a day of joyous anticipation of Easter. Traditionally, Catholics celebrated the Sunday by visiting the church in which they were baptized, becoming known as "Mothering Sunday." The day was also called "Five Loaves Sunday", referring to the multiplication of the fish and loves story I the gospel. So as your Lenten journey continues, keep your eye on what is to come.



categories used for priests and the male members of religious communities can be confusing, especially since the categories can sometimes be intertwined as a man can be both a priest and a monk, or a brother and a friar. So, to help to piece the puzzle together, it's important to begin by noting some basic distinctions:

The distinction between priests (who are ordained for sacramental ministry) and brothers (who are nonordained members of religious communities and who are committed to lives of prayer and service).

Priests: A priest is a man who has been ordained for sacramental ministry and these fall into two categories: A) Diocesan (or Secular) Priests can either be attached to a diocese and who serve under a bishop. Their ministry is usually oriented toward pastoral service. B) Religious Priests are members of religious communities (like the Franciscans, Jesuits, Salvatorians, or Carmelites) and their lives are guided by the special mission and charism of their community. While both kinds of priest practice sacramental ministry, their spirituality and how they live out their priesthood can be very different.

Brothers: Brothers are non-ordained members of religious communities (such as those mentioned above) who live lives committed to prayer and service. Religious priests and brothers serve together in their communities and their ministries include much more than the care of parishes.

Monks, Friars, and Canons: These are broad categories which include religious priests and brothers, and each of these is connected to specific ways of life and spiritualities

Eucharist for the homebound—If you are homebound and wish to receive Communion at home, call the church office at 634-3813.

Hospital Visits—If you find yourself or a loved one in the hospital, and would like a visit from a priest, please call the church office directly and leave the patient's name, room number, and name of hospital. Due to privacy laws, hospitals are not allowed to give out patient's names, making it challenging to know who would like a visit.



Anointing of the Sick is available on request. If you or a family member wish to be anointed before surgery, when in the hospital, or for any sickness, please

contact Fr. Joe. He can be reached by calling the parish office at 634-3813, and if necessary, by leaving a message on Extension 20.

The Anointing of the Sick is offered at regular intervals in the parish and at area nursing homes.

Baptism Classes— Baptism class is required before a first Baptism. Parents expecting their first child should attend. For questions contact the church office.



The Wedding Policy of the Diocese of St. Cloud



requires that you contact the parish at least 6 months prior to your wedding. This is necessary so that all the required steps can be completed in a timely manner. For second marriages, more time may be required. To begin your marriage preparation or for questions about the marriage preparation policy, contact Father Joe (634-3813).
