

LISTENING

The April issue of The Central Minnesota Catholic magazine focused on the importance of listening or Holy listening.

Listening is not merely hearing someone's view or their sorrows. It is also responding in a positive way. If I disagree with someone, can I compromise? If they have a problem, can I suggest a remedy or a new way of dealing with their trouble?

Listening is at times accepting criticism and considering how I might change my view or my actions. Holy listening is a part of our reading Scripture and Prayer and hearing what God has to say to us.

The Catholic church has not always been a good listener. When Martin Luther confronted Pope Leo X in 1517 concerning his sale of indulgences to rebuild St. Peter's Basilica, Pope Leo X dismissed him as unimportant.

Pope Leo X was known for supporting a war against the French, enabling family members to rise to positions of power in the Italian government, and spending lavishly on art and building projects. Many of his biographers suggest he was partly responsible for the Protestant reformation.

There is much noise and confusion on television, radio, and the internet. There are many voices shouting for our attention. In this final week leading up to Jesus' death and resurrection we might tune out some of these noises and seek out silence. In the silence we are better able to recognize our thoughts, pray and respond to God.

Holy Week can become overly busy with liturgies, fish fries and sports. I encourage you to take in at least one of the liturgies of Mandy Thursday, Good Friday or Holy Saturday. Observe a Christian Passover with a sitdown family dinner on Friday or Saturday evening.

Things about Palm Sunday which remind us Christ is King.

- 1. God's Word tell us people cut palm branches, waved them in the air, and laid them on the ground before Jesus as he rode into the city. The palm branches represented goodness and victory and was symbolic of the final victory he would soon fulfill over death.
- 2. Jesus chose to ride in on a donkey, which directly fulfilled the Old Testament prophecy of Zechariah 9:9. In biblical times, it was common for kings or important people to arrive by a procession riding on a donkey. The donkey symbolized peace, so those who chose to ride them showed they came with peaceful intentions. Jesus even reminded us He is the Prince of Peace.
- 3. When the people shouted "Hosanna!" they were hailing Christ as King. Hosanna actually means "save now" and though in their minds they waited for the earthly king, God had a different way in mind of bringing true salvation to all who would trust him.
- 4. The Bible say Jesus wept for Jerusalem. In the midst of the praise of the moment, He knew in His heart it wouldn't be long until these same people would turn their backs on Him, betray Him, and crucify Him. His heart broke with the reality of how much they needed a Savior.
- 5. Palm Sunday reminds us the reign of Christ is far greater then any the mind of man could ever conceive or plan. Man looked for someone to fight their battles in the present day world. Yet God had the ultimate plan of sending His Son to fight the final battle over death. This is the greatness of who we celebrate this week. Because of Christ's ultimate sacrifice, we can be set free of death.

A God Who Knows How It Feels

Christ could have spoken anything from the cross, so why did he choose to recite Psalm 22? And why is it so important

that we recite that same Psalm at today's Mass?

"My God, my God, why have You abandoned me?"

We've never known the Jesus of the Gospels to doubt the will of God. We've never known him to be a defeatist or to give into feelings of despair. He's the hero who walks on water, the Savior who is welcomed to Jerusalem with a pathway of palms. And he knows how this story ends; he knows full well that his Father has absolutely *not* abandoned him.


So why does he say this? Jesus doesn't make offhanded comments, especially in his last hour. Today, when we repeat the words that he calls out in his darkest moment, we must remember that he wants us, very particularly, to consider them.

With his crucifixion, Jesus reminds us of his humanity. He is a man of flesh that can be torn and blood that can be shed. Somehow, in tandem with his divinity, he still possesses a heart which knows fear and pain and longing. And with this seemingly hopeless cry, he reminds us of that.

Let us never doubt Jesus can relate to us in our brokenness. This is the week, friends. This is the week that reminds us that our God is a God who knows every pang, every trembling, and every uncertainty of human life. Our God knows what abandonment feels like. He knows what rejection feels like. He knows what it is to keep going when the strength and the will has disappeared.

hospital. Due to privacy laws, hospitals are not allowed to give out patient's names, making it challenging to know who would like a visit.

The Anointing of the Sick is offered at regular intervals in the parish and at area nursing homes.

Baptism Classes— Baptism class is required before a first Baptism. Parents expecting their first child should attend. For questions contact the church office.

The Wedding Policy of the Diocese of St. Cloud

requires that you contact the parish at least 6 months prior to your wedding. This is necessary so that all the required steps can be completed in a timely manner. For second marriages, more time may be required. To begin your marriage preparation or for questions about the marriage preparation policy, contact Father Joe (634-3813).
