

THE GIFT OF PEACE

Happy Easter season! Now we can hope the weather will cooperate and usher in Spring time.

Following the death and resurrection of Jesus, the apostles were afraid. They had not yet seen the risen Lord. They were gathered in the upper room to avoid capture and imprisonment by the Roman authorities. The first Christians represented a threat to both the Jewish religious leaders and the Roman leaders because they followed the teachings of Jesus, rather than their teachings.

Jesus appeared to them and said, "Peace be with you." In this simple phrase Jesus gave them confidence to continue living their lives. Soon after they returned both to their former jobs and their new form of worship. From this small group of friends, the Christian faith would spread around the world.

Our inner peace comes from the knowledge we are living for the kingdom of God. We are, as Paul says, "In the world, but not of the world."

We can resist the violence of actions and words which have become so much a part of American life and the American media. Let's not be the mean girls on The View. Let's be more like the nice girls, the religious Sisters who care for the poor and the sick.

Everyday Stewardship

Today is the Day After my mother passed away, my sister and father had a falling out of sorts. When he moved to be closer to me, she told me

that she didn't ever want to speak to him again, saying, "Even if he is on his death bed, do not call me." My father was in his late 70's, and the pain he would have felt if he knew her wishes would have been too much to bear. Because of this, I made a decision to not tell him. This also put a strain on my relationship with my sister as I cared for the one person in this world she seemed to despise the most.

Of all the gifts God has given us, time and family are at the top of the list to be cherished. Also, both are finite gifts. Our family members will not walk in this world forever, and each day that slips away cannot be restored. Still, we build up walls of fear, doubt, resentment, anger, and pain, not allowing ourselves to forgive and be good stewards of what we have been given.

On Divine Mercy Sunday, God's mercy is overflowing through all the earth. There is no excuse for you and me to not be reconciled with God and accept this profound compassion. In turn, there is no excuse to not extend that mercy and reconcile with those who have hurt us.

I always believed I would have a renewed relationship with my sister when my father's death would come to pass. Two weeks after he passed, my sister suddenly died as well. There is no rewind of time. Yes, good stewards, today is the day! — *Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS* ©LPi

The Second Sunday of Easter is also known as Divine Mercy Sunday. The day is based on private revelations of St. Faustina Kowalska, which recommended a particular devotion to the divine Mercy.

It did not become part of the Church's calendar until 2000, when Pope John Paul II canonized St. Faustina and declared the importance of accepting the chole message which comes to us from the word of God on this Second Sunday of Easter.

The image of the Divine Mercy is a depiction of Jesus at the moment he appears to the disciples in the Upper Room, after the Resurrection, when he empowers them to forgive or retain sins. This moment is recorded in John 20:19-31, which is the Gospel reading for this Sunday every year.

A basic explanation of the image. Jesus is shown as raising his right hand in blessing, and pointing to his left hand on his chest from which flow forth two translucent rays; one red and one white. The red ray symbolizes the blood of Jesus, and the white the water. The whole image is symbolic of charity forgiveness, and love of God, and referred to as the "fountain of Mercy." The depiction often contains the message, "Jesus, I trust in You!"

requires that you contact the parish at least 6 months prior to your wedding. This is necessary so that all the required steps can be completed in a timely manner.
